3- Reveal and Score

The Player of Honour places and reveals their #5 Player card next to the Topic card they like the least.





• The IKnow This One! card gives 1 bonus point for a correct answer.

The players then repeat these actions in descending order.







When all the *Player* cards are revealed, the **Player of Honour**

can count their points. They earn the same amount of points as the Guesser who earned the most points that round.

Every Guesser who got everything right gets 1 bonus point and gives the Player of Honour a high five!

Marie had two correct answers, but her I Know This One! card didn't earn her any points. → She gets **2 points**.

and **1 bonus point** for his *I Know*

Eric had 3 correct answers

This One! card.

→ He gets **4 points**.



Simon managed to get all of Sarah's preferences right! As a result, he gets **5 points** for his 5 correct answers, 1 bonus point for his IKnow This One! card, and 1 bonus point and a high five from Sarah for his 5 correct answers. → He gets **7 points**.

Sarah gets the same number of points as the best Guesser, so she gets 7 points too!

4 - End of Turn

The player seated next to the **Player of** Honour becomes the new Player of Honour. Place 5 new Topic cards from the deck onto the table. Repeat the previous steps until every player has been the **Player of** *Honour* twice (with 4 or fewer players) or once (with 5 or more players).



"Duo" Variant (2 players)

In this 2-player variant, there are no Guessers. Both players are Players of Honour and place their Player cards in the order of their own preferences. They will not use their IKnow This One! card.

Both players then reveal their *Player* cards and score 1 point for every matching answer. The game ends after 10 rounds, with 50 points being a perfect score.

→ But it would be kind of freaky, right...? 15 points is already a pretty darn good score!
